

College Visit Checklist for

Students With Disabilities



Congratulations on taking the first steps to furthering your education and creating a brighter future for yourself. Finding the right fit for your higher education experience is a long journey and may seem even more challenging for students with disabilities, but we are here to help. This guide serves as a tool to use during college visits to help you determine if the college or university will meet your specific needs and will be a good fit for you.

Students who experience Emotional Disorders (ex: Anxiety, Bipolar Disorder, PTSD) or Autism Spectrum Disorders often have sensory needs. This checklist provides a few things to consider when you're touring colleges and evaluating whether they would be a good fit for you. Since Emotional Disorders and Autism Spectrum Disorder include a range, all items on this checklist will not be relevant to every student. Take into consideration your personal needs and don't forget to ask the questions YOU really need answered to help you be successful in college.

The guide is organized into sections based on your education route:

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Classrooms
Tour the classrooms and lecture halls to determine the seating arrangements and chairs. Determine it
the seating arrangement or type of chairs would cause negative sensory input.
Can adjustments for lighting or temperature be accommodated in the classroom?
How large is a typical class size?
Are there large lecture classes?
How large is a typical lecture hall?
Are there smaller lab or discussion sections
Is assistive technology available in the classroom? If so, what permissions do you need to use it?
Housing
Are you required to live on campus?
What are the dorm rooms like at the college?
Will your room be a single or a double?
Does each dorm room have its own bathroom, or is it a communal bathroom?
Are you able to dim or brighten the lights in your dorm room?
Do you need to be able to control the temperature in your dorm room?
Dining
Does Dining Services accommodate food sensitivities?
Ask to tour the cafeteria to get a sense of what food is being offered.
Tour the dining hall to see if it is too noisy for you.
Does Dining Services have "to go" boxes available if the dining hall is too noisy for you?

Classroom Accommodations and Accommodation Process

 □ Does the documentation you have match the documentation that the campus is requesting? □ Does Student Services or the Disability Coordinator allow scheduling accommodations? □ Does Student Services or the Disability Coordinator accommodate early or priority registration to allow you to schedule around your needs?

Do you need a different mode of communication, such as speech-to-text or text-to-speech in order to
communicate more effectively?
 Can accommodations be provided in a course with a discussion section or required verbal
participation?
Can Student Services accommodate for a decreased workload if you need more time and can't handle a
full workload?
NOTE: This may impact your financial aid eligibility.
Are alternate testing locations provided, or can you request an alternate testing location?
The following are common accommodations for students with disabilities that you may need and can
request. from the college/university:
Note taker or recorded lectures
Extended time on tests
Extended time on coursework
Use of fidgets
Seat preference or standing-room
NOTE: If you're someone who likes to stand or needs to stand in order to fidget, it might be best to get
this accommodation approved through the university. Be sure to let professors know that you are
allowed to stand instead of sit.

Support Services and Service Animals

Support Services
Where is the Office of Student Services located in case you need to visit a counseling office or the
disability support office?
Where is counseling located, if it is not in a Student Services building?
Does the counseling office or student support services offer a peer support group for students with Autism
or other emotional processing disorders?
Where is tutoring offered, in case you need extra help?
Is there a writing center if you're someone who struggles with expressive language?
Are students provided with an academic advisor for all four years?
Service Animals
If you require the use of a service animal, be sure to determine the process for bringing a service
animal onto campus, and where they are allowed.
NOTE: Service animals are allowed under ADA/504 with a documented disability. Colleges and
universities cannot prevent you from bringing your service animal. An Emotional Support animal,
however, may not meet the same requirements.

Will the Admissions Office let you sit in on a class during a tour of the campus?

	Can you be permitted to live at home all four years if you need to?
	Will you be in a single or double?
	Can accommodations be made to have a single room if needed?
	Does each dorm room have its own bathroom, or is it a communal bathroom?
